



Rocky Mountain Arsenal National Wildlife Refuge Cohort 6.0, 2016-17

CLTL visited Denver to learn about the transformation of Rocky Mountain Arsenal into an area with great conservation value for species reintroduction and recreation. Students met with federal agents, city representatives, and community members to understand this complex story and develop an informational video.

PROJECT SPOTLIGHT Cohort 5.0, 2015-16

Perceptions of Human-Wildlife Conflict in Kenya

A CLTL student in Kenya worked with the Ewaso Lions organization to compare perceptions and attitudes towards carnivores with reported attacks on livestock. She found a disconnect between carnivore involvement in attacks and community attitudes. Her report will empower the community to protect carnivores and address risks of livestock predation.

Daniela Bueso Cohort 6.0, 2016-17

Daniela moved to the United States from Colombia at age 12. After graduating from university, she served in Peace Corps in Paraguay, where she worked on environmental education and sustainability projects. Daniela partnered with Blue Ventures in Belize for her Capstone Project to develop management strategies that address the invasive lionfish.
