Ph.D. Assistantship in Human Dimensions of Wildlife (Available for Fall 2018)

The Department of Parks, Recreation and Tourism Management (PRTM) at North Carolina State University invites applications for a doctoral research assistantship beginning in Fall 2018. The successful applicant will work under the supervision of Dr. Lincoln Larson on a study evaluating college students' beliefs, attitudes, and behaviors related to hunting and wildlife conservation. This research project is sponsored by the Association of Fish & Wildlife Agencies' Multistate Conservation Grant Program (AFWA) as part of the organization's ongoing efforts to enhance hunter recruitment/retention and conservation. Working with collaborators at NC State, the candidate will have a unique opportunity to help coordinate a team of established researchers and practitioners from 26 public universities and state wildlife agencies across all regions of the United States. Key Responsibilities & Opportunities:

- Research: Work with faculty advisor and partners to advance human dimensions of wildlife conservation theory and practice, generating conservation impacts; Assist with study design, data collection, and analysis, implementing a multi-phase project across 13 states.
- Writing & Communication: Assist or lead in developing academic presentations, peerreviewed journal articles, non-technical reports (e.g., Practitioner's Guide), outreach materials, and other deliverables.
- <u>Teaching & Mentoring</u>: Train and supervise undergraduate research assistants and/or serve as a teaching assistant in PRTM courses.
- <u>Professional Development & Networking</u>: Interact with partners from a wide range of academic and professional backgrounds, fostering professional connections and potential employment opportunities across multiple sectors.

Required Qualifications:

- Master's degree (preferably thesis-based) in human dimensions of natural resources, parks and recreation management, or a related discipline
- Desire to pursue a Ph.D. degree in Parks, Recreation, and Tourism Management (or related field within the <u>College of Natural Resources</u>)
- Background or experience in quantitative (survey-based) data collection and analysis
- Strong verbal and writing communication skills
- Strong leadership, organizational, and project management skills
- Ability to collaboratively work with others
- Meet admissions requirements of the NC State Graduate School (found here)

Desired Qualifications:

- Strong interest in wildlife conservation attitudes and behaviors
- Experience working for or with state or federal wildlife management agencies
- Experience studying or working with hunters and hunting

Assistantship Package: The assistantship provides an annual stipend of \$18,000 that also includes tuition, student fees, health insurance, and funds to support professional development. It assumes 20 hours per week dedicated to the project and 20 hours dedicated to coursework. Position is renewable for up to 3 years based on satisfactory progress.

Starting Date: The targeted (negotiable) starting date for the assistantship is <u>August 15, 2018</u>.

Position will remain open until filled, with all applications submitted by <u>January 15, 2018</u> receiving full consideration. If selected for the position, applicants will be asked to <u>submit an online application</u> to the NC State Graduate School.
