UMaine Research Assistant for Registered Maine Guide Policy Review

Position Title: Student Research Assistant
Project: Policy Review of Maine's Registered Maine Guide (RMG) Program
Duration: February 1, 2024 - December 31, 2024
Funding: Up to 10 hours/wk at a rate of \$15.80-\$18.80/hour, depending on student experience
Eligibility: Graduate and Undergraduate students can apply

Project Description:

The Registered Maine Guide (RMG) system was <u>created in 1897</u>, and though there have been revisions to the original statute, the basics have remained the same for over a century: people who receive compensation for leading others into the woods and onto the waterways of the state of Maine must be a Registered Maine Guide.

There have been two major exemptions created for the RMG statute: the Camp Trip Leader (CTL) exemption and the Educational Trip Leader (ETL) exemption. The <u>CTL program</u> was originally established in the 1980's, in recognition that it was not realistic for summer camps in Maine to hire RMGs for all of their outings. The <u>ETL program</u> was established in 2020 for the same reasons, but for educational institutions. In both cases, interested parties did not want the constraints of RMG statute to limit youth participation in outdoor activities.

There is an on-going conflict between the goal of having the RMG licensing process be related to participant safety and the desire to make use of the RMG brand for marketing or commercial purposes. This conflict limits the State's ability to assess the utility of the statute, and make potentially helpful changes.

The purpose of this research is to:

- Uncover the issues still remaining with the RMG statute and rules, as well as any new challenges caused by the latest statutory exemption (ETL),
- Gather data, including Search and Rescue (SAR) and incident data, that would be helpful in supporting the policy analysis, and
- Provide a comprehensive policy analysis that could be used by interested parties in developing a more durable policy solution to the problems at hand.

Student Research Position Description:

The student will work closely with the faculty research team, and will be responsible for gathering and organizing secondary data related to the policy analysis. This will include existing statutes and policies, as well as incident and search and rescue data. Additional primary data gathering, such as surveys, may also be required. Training in these kinds of research techniques will be provided as needed.
