Word from the Principal

Dear Parents and Carers.

This payment will be credited to your College fee account. The annual CSEF amount per student is \$225 for secondary school students and \$125 for primary school students.

It is the expectation that students attend the College dressed correctly in the full College uniform. A compulsory part of the uniform for Term 1 and 4 is a College Hat. These hats are now available at Noone Uniforms in Officer at a cost of \$17.50.



Positive Behaviour Support (Consequences) - Part 3

Dear Parents and Families.







This week we will explore the second Universal of Positive Behaviour Support, **Consequences**. Consequences are a result of our own choices. A consequence can be likened to a vehicle travelling along the road to a destination.

A College wide approach to using consequences creates a predictable, consistent, positive environment for students. Consequences are outcomes that happen as a result of actions. Consequences can be employed either to encourage the behaviour to occur again or to discourage the behaviour from occurring again. When selecting consequences they should be logical, meaning that they directly relate to repairing the situation and to make restitution. Before using consequences it is vital that teaching, prompting and acknowledging expectations has occurred.

Effective consequences involve the following:

- Maintaining the dignity and psychological and physical safety of the students
- Being clear, fair and consistent
- Assisting students to become aware of the impact of the behaviour on others
- Building the capacity and ability of students to utilise social and emotional learning skills
- Using negotiation strategies to come to a joint decision and resolution
- Explicitly teaching, modelling demonstrating, practising and reviewing expectations and consequences
- Applying natural and logical consequences for all behaviour
- Focusing on teachable moments
- Using a restorative approach focused on re-establishing positive relationships
- Being gradually progressive, related to the seriousness and repetition of behaviour
- Documenting and recording incidents, issues and agreed outcomes, following up within a reasonable timeframe.

It is important not to confuse consequences with punishments. Punishments are done to the student, and not necessarily used to help the students. Punishments can be used with the intent to pay back and at times inflict misery with the belief that the pain will influence the students to avoid repeating the behaviour that landed them in trouble. If we are dealing with students who face multiple difficulties it is impossible to punish them more than life itself already has, which is why punishment is not a sustainable or effective approach.

The way a consequence is implemented can be more important than the consequence itself in determining its effectiveness. Consequences are best enacted calmly, privately, and with the utmost dignity. A wellbeing and discipline model should focus on teaching and learning rather than retribution or punishment. God bless,

Private lessons of 20 min are \$19 and 30 min are \$28 per week.



St Gabriel of Our Lady of Sorrows

1838 - 1862

Saint Gabriel was born at Assisi in 1838. He was guided by Our Lady into the Passionist Order founded by Saint Paul of the Cross, and became a veritable Apostle of Her Sorrows. He was a very great and truly contemplative soul, whose only preoccupation was to unite himself to God at all times. He allowed no distractions to enter his spirit, and even though Italy, his country, was in a state of ferment when he entered religion, he wanted to know nothing of it.



The way to attain union with our Saviour and our Lord's Passion and the Compassion of His Mother. God was, for Saint Gabriel, as for Saint Louis de Montfort, his Heavenly Mother. He wrote home to his father, from the first month of his noviciate, "Believe your son, whose heart is speaking by his lips; no, I would not exchange one single quarter of an hour spent near the Most Blessed Virgin Mary, our consolatrix, our protectress and our hope, for a year or several years spent in the diversions and

spectacles of the earth." Among his resolutions was that of visiting Jesus in the Most Blessed Sacrament each day, and praying for the gift of a tender and efficacious devotion to His Most Holy Mother. He wrote a beautiful Credo, worthy to be printed in letters of gold, expressing all that he believed of the Mother of God.

At twenty-four years of age Saint Gabriel died of tuberculosis, having already attained heroic sanctity by a life of self-denial and great devotion to our

Although his life was without any miraculous event, after his death in 1862 many miracles occurred at his tomb in Isola di Gran Sasso, Italy. He was canonized by Pope Benedict XV in 1920, and his feast was extended to the entire church by Pope Pius XI in 1932. He is the patron of youth, and especially of young religious.
