FACCC'S Sponsored Legislation

AB 1326 (Arambula) County Liaison Bill - PASSED

Requires county human services agencies to designate a staff liaison as a point of contact for higher education counselors and requires each segment to create a survey to review the effectiveness of the position in five years.

- COVID has worsened the food insecurity, homelessness, mental health concerns and many other issues faced by our students. The bill will help to bridge the gap between county and college services for students who may benefit from those services.
- FACCC sponsored a similar bill in 2018 that died in Senate Appropriations.
- No opposition.
- Will go into effect January 1, 2022.



FACCC'S Sponsored Legislation

SR 45 Relative to academic freedom. In progress

The Senate declares that academic freedom is a necessary requisite for teaching and learning in California Community Colleges.

• Assigned to Senate Judiciary and will be heard early next year.



FACCC'S Co-Sponsored Legislation

AB 375 (Medina) Increase Part-Time Faculty Load - VETOED

Would increase the percentage of hours part-time faculty may teach to up to 85% of the hours per week as a full-time employee with comparable duties.

- Districts would not have to be required to give part-time faculty more classes.
 Bill required districts to negotiate.
- The FON, which set by the CCCCO, has becomes the ceiling.
- The amount of PT faculty nor the amount of classes they teach affect the FON
- Would allow part-time faculty to teach more classes at one college instead of "Freeway flying"

FACCC'S Co-Sponsored Legislation

<u>AB 1432 (Low)</u> Elimination of Calbright - Two-Year Bill

This bill would make the California Online Community College Act inoperative at the end of 2022–23 academic year.

<u>AB 1269 (Garcia)</u> Part-time Parity - Two -Year Bill

Require the CCCCO to conduct a comprehensive study of part-time faculty identifying a statewide definition of part-time faculty parity that could be applied locally.



2021 Successful Legislation

AB 928 (Berman) Transfer Process & Reform PASSED FACCC opposed

- Establish the Associate Degree for Transfer Intersegmental Implementation Committee to serve as the primary entity charged with the oversight of the ADT;
- 2. Require the Intersegmental Committee of the Academic Senates to establish a singular lower division GE pathway that meets the academic requirements necessary for transfer admission into both segments;
- 3. **Require** CCCs to place students who **declare a goal of transfer on the ADT pathway** if such a pathway exists for their intended major.




Real Barriers to Transfers

- Total cost of college
- Student basic needs
- Access to counselors and program planning
- Capacity at the CSUs
- ADTs not a guarantee particularly for impacted majors and landlocked students
- CSUs auditing transcripts and not honoring the ADTs

Educational Reformers - Wolf in sheep's clothing

- Corporations fund and drive policy change through non-profit advocacy groups
- Messaging always about "equity" but outcomes aren't necessarily improving equity
- Difficult to advocate against their reforms once they are labeled as in the name of "equity"
- What are the "Reformers" true motivations for changing public education? Increase student loans?Public money funneled to private sector?
- Not advocating for reforms that would increase money for public education, such as commercial property tax reform or ending tax credits.



Renewed focus on advocacy needed

AB 928 (Berman) FACCC opposed

- Opposed by all system practitioners: ASCCC, FACCC, SSCCC, CCLC, and the CCCCO.
- Little to no opposition in the legislator
- Signed by Gov. Newsom

The bill sponsor, The Campaign for College Opportunity's tactics were to lie in testimony, bash the faculty and bully the students into supporting the bills

And they have more legislation - not done yet!



Common Course Numbering

2021-22 State Budget act - July 2021

• Allocate \$10 million to the CCCCO to form a workgroup to support the development and implementation of a common course numbering system throughout the CCCs.

AB 1111 (Berman) Common Course Numbering FACCC opposed

- Require the establishment of a common course numbering system for all GE and transfer pathway courses throughout the CCCs by July 1, 2024;
- Urge the common course numbering workgroup (see above) to consider starting with courses in the current C-ID system and expand from there.



Concerns about Common Course Numbering

- What's the problem are we trying to fix?
- Time consuming and costly
- Not all local courses are the same units, semesters vs. quarters, support courses
- C-IDs numbering can be more than one course per campus
- District organizes its governance, budgets, policies, hiring, and CBAs through academic programs.
- Will limit the students attempts to repeat a course more than 3 times for successful completion through out the system



Other FACCC Supported Bills

AB 245 (Chiu) Student records: name & gender changes. PASSED

Districts required to update a former student's records to include the student's updated legal name or gender

AB 337 (Medina) Board of Governors of the CCCs PASSED

Board of Governors - two student voting members

<u>AB 396 (Gabriel) CalFresh: educational programs PASSED</u>

Clarifies the state and federal eligibility requirements for a campus-based program to be a state-approved local educational programs that increase employability that qualifies for the CalFresh student eligibility



Other FACCC Supported Bills

AB 417 (McCarty) Rising Scholars Network PASSED

The CCCCO to establish a program, named the Rising Scholars Network, to enter into agreements with up to 50 community colleges to provide additional funds for services in support of postsecondary education for justice-involved students

<u>AB 927</u> (Medina) Statewide baccalaureate degree program PASSED

Would extend the operation of the statewide baccalaureate degree pilot program indefinitely.

AB 1456 (Medina) Student financial aid: Cal Grant Reform Act. VETOED

Would enact the Cal Grant Reform Act, which would revise and recast the provisions establishing and governing the existing Cal Grant Program into a new Cal Grant Program.

2021-22 State Budget

Full Time Faculty

2018: \$50 million for full time faculty hiring 2021: \$100 million for full time faculty hiring

Part Time Faculty \$100 million to support and compensation for office hours and professional development

Student-Centered Funding Formula (SCFF) Hold harmless through 2024-25

State Budget 5% COLA

Payback of deferrals

AB 1326 (Arambula) - 2021

Allows districts to use restricted lottery funds for student basic needs.

AB 2884 (Berman) - 2020

Allows districts to use restricted lottery funds for student basic needs.

AB 595 (Medina) - 2019

Allows undocumented students to use an Individual Taxpayer Identification Number (ITIN) in lieu of a social security number when enrolling in career education programs with a background check component.

AB 706 (Low) - 2019

Eliminates the three year time limit on the transfer of sick leave between districts.




