Safe Water Program

The impact the filter project has in a rural village is observed during follow-up visits. Not only is filter function assessed and hygiene teaching reinforced, but additional dangers to health in the village are observed such as sharing living space with animals and children going barefoot.

Providing clean water seems to be just the first step when confronted with the realities of village life but the training the villagers receive in hygiene, and having clean water to drink does make a difference. Children are healthier and have fewer bouts of diarrhea.



According to epidemiologists, more than 50% of acute diarrhea is caused by contaminated water so the bright blue filter in the picture ensures that children are at least 50% healthier.

CAPD co-sponsored a one day seminar on Household Water Treatment for Rotarians from five regions of Colombia. The attendees learned about the effectiveness of Household Water Treatment as a sustainable solution to improve health in rural populations without potable water. They observed the various steps of filter construction and had a lively discussions on how to organize and finance projects in their regions. GREEN LIGHT EDUCATION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM



The Education Assistance program encourages children to work hard in their studies and families to take pride in their schools. In order to stay in the program, students must maintain a 75% average and parents (or designate) must participate in school improvement projects. Their involvement produces a sense of ownership and pride as students achieve good marks and parents transform the school. In 2014, the Green Light program provided uniforms to 947 children in the states of Santander and Risaralda. Urban students (top two photos,) proudly display their day and sport uniforms received by the program.



A rural student and her mother (below) show their gratitude with smiles. This student, and over 400 rural students like her, received a pair of shoes, socks and T-shirts this year instead of a lunch subsidy. Our lunch subsidy program ended when the government started proving free lunches to all students. By receiving shoes and other items of clothing, the student receives an extra benefit that they did not receive in previous years.



Parents and students from rural schools (below) engage in a school improvement project such as the ones you see below—keeping the school yard tidy, planting flowers, grasses and trees, and refurbishing school desks. In urban areas, parents help their local school with tasks such as cleaning and fundraising. All these activities help to build community and a sense of ownership.

INTEGRATION PROGRAM

Our Colombian partners in the Integration program, FANDIC & ASODISPIE, provide opportunities for children and youth with disabilities through programs of rehabilitation, recreation, and special education. FANDIC now has two centres, the original centre in the North of Bucaramanga, and a new central location. ASODISPIE is located in Piedecuesta and their centre continues to expand through construction of new facilities such as a multi-functional salon and a technical aids workshop. Both organizations have very positive impact on children and youth with disability in their respective locations. Pictures below depict some of their activities.
