



Terms and Definitions

Documented Vs. Undocumented

Documented

- U.S. Citizens or nationals
- U.S. Permanent Resident
- Eligible non-citizens

Undocumented

- Entered the U.S. without inspection or with fraudulent documents; or
- Entered legally but then violated the terms of the status and remained in the county without authorization
- "No tengo papeles" "I dont have papers"





DACA (Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals)

- Enacted in June 15, 2012 as an Executive Action under President Obama
- Protected status from deportation and eligible for a work authorization
- □ In NC, DACA recipients:
 - Don't qualify for state or federal financial aid
 - Considered out-of-state for tuition and admission purposes



Diverse Immigrant Statuses

- Non-immigrant status
- Temporary Protected Status (TPS)
- Refugee/Asylee
- Lawful permanent resident



Are there any statuses that prohibit students from attending college?



Mixed Status Families

- Families that do not share the same citizenship or immigration status
- □ Complete FAFSA with some recommendations
- □ Many families rely on the support of their children
- Difficulties navigating processes





Hispanics in North Carolina

- OVER A MILLION
- 11% of NC population
- 6 of every 10 are U.S-Born
 - 57% identity as Mexican ancestry
- 77% Speaks other language than English at home
- on-time enrollment lowest among hispanic graduates
- 15% hold bachelor's degree
- Most likely to report intentions to post secondary education via the NCCCS
 - 12% NCCCS Student Body

Challenges

Lack of Information/Misinformation

- Large number of first generation students
- □ Familiarity with the U.S system and practices
- Their status or parents prevent them from attending
- Language
- Constant fear of disclosure and deportation
- "Catching up"

Processes

- state, federal and local rules (admissions, financial aid, residency)
- □ Mentorship/sponsorships within their communities
- **G** Representation within institutions (faculty and staff)
- Cultural clashes, and disparities

Admissions/ Enrollment

- Open-door admissions policy at NCCCS
 - DACA
 - Undocumented
 - Other statues
 - Foreign credits?

Licensure

- State, national, and institutional constraints
- Constraints for specific program of study
- After finishing the program



Licensure

- Does this program lead to a licensure or other exam certification?
- □ Is a SSN Required for the exam?
- Are there any other requirements for licensure/certification?
- Potential Employment for students without licensure/credential?
- Other requirements/issues for those that are not US Citizens/
- □ Are there any funding opportunities?





State and federal educational benefits

Residency

- □ Residency Determination Service (RDS)
 - □ RDS is a uniform process for determining NC residency used for in-state tuition and NC grant eligibility.
 - DACA and undocumented students are NOT eligible for in-state tuition and state financial aid.

Financial Aid and other Strategies

- FAFSA
- Scholarships
- □ Apprenticeship
- NCCCS Tuition Classification exemptions



Tuition Classification Exemptions at NC Community Colleges

- Business-Sponsored Students
- Business & Military -Transferred Families
- *Non-Profit Tuition Sponsorship
- *Public School Graduates
- Refugee
- Non-Resident of the US ("Pending Permanent Resident")
- Federal Law Enforcement Officers

*DACA & Undocumented not eligible



Maximize career and college experiences

- **Explore all strategies to minimize overall costs, such as:**
 - Earn college credit during high school
 - □ Career & College Promise
 - Advanced Placement
 - □ Career and Technical Education (CTE)
 - Continuing Education Courses > Workforce
- Take a college level exam
 - College Board College Level Examination Program (CLEP)
- College affordability programs
 - Transfer Program: Comprehensive Articulation Agreement
 - Explore college promise programs
- Internships and apprenticeships






Recommendations
