Henry George wrote Progress and Poverty in order to identify and resolve the great paradox of modern industrial life. How was it possible for abject poverty, financial instability, and extreme economic inequality to co-exist with rising productivity and technological progress? He analyzed and rejected the widely held beliefs that poverty inevitably followed from the laws of economics or from a Darwinian struggle for survival of the fittest.

He did not succumb to the panacea of arbitrarily confiscating property or taking rom the rich to give to the poor.

George argued that taxes on productive labour should be drastically reduced. The activities of society as a whole give natural resources, such as urban land or the E-M spectrum, their value. It is both equitable and efficient for society to recapture these community-created values to support healthcare, education or public transit.
