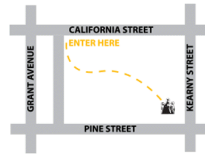
**September 22, 2018** – We are resolute in proclaiming it loud and clear for everyone to learn about the “Comfort Women” Memorial and the history behind it.
