First Steps to Independence: Evaluating a Behaviourally Informed Travel Training Programme

Project background

Today's children are growing up in tough times. Funding for children's services is under serious pressure, mental health problems are increasingly common, and the COVID pandemic has disrupted childhoods across the UK. One group of children particularly affected by such adverse climates are those with special educational needs and disability (SEND). Norfolk County Council (NCC) are committed to ensure that all children and young people with SEND reach their potential and thrive and are working together with The University of East Anglia (UEA) to continue to improve and evaluate a programme for SEND children, which aims to equip them with a skill fundamental to a teenage and adult life: independent travel skills. Travelling independently unlocks the door to social activities, employment, education, or volunteering opportunities, helps to combat social isolation, and ultimately supports individuals to achieve and maintain an economically active and fulfilling life.

Current home to school transport provision can be detrimental to the environment and contribute to budget pressures for local authorities. Where appropriate, if children and young people are able to switch to greener, healthier, and more sustainable modes of transport (e.g., public transport, cycling or walking), there could be benefits to all. This project, the first of its kind, will evaluate whether behavioural science informed independent travel training can support these goals. The successful student will be pivotal in achieving project objectives from leading the proposed final design of the randomised control trial (RCT), working closely with NCC to ensure it is implemented appropriately and that data collection are robust, to leading the trial data analysis.

Project aims and objectives

The overall aim of this project is to evaluate the impact of a behavioural science informed independent travel training programme (for SEND children, 11+ years old) in four dimensions:

- 1. Progress towards independent travel
- 2. School attendance, behaviour, and attainment
- 3. Non-cognitive skills, behavioural and psychological measures (e.g., confidence, self-esteem, quality of life, adult skill development, risk-aversion)
- 4. Broader impacts (e.g., parental burden, child-parent relationship quality, Local Authority expenditure)

To achieve this aim, the successful student will design and conduct a RCT on approximately 30 schools in Norfolk. In anticipation of this studentship UEA and NCC have been working together conducting small-scale pilot/feasibility trials in the area to provide the evidence base for the student to build on.

The objectives of the project are to

- 1. Determine the final outcome variables, intervention (i.e., the nature of the behavioural science informed training programme), data collection methods and trial design;
- 2. Evaluate travel training interventions;
- 3. Develop policy guidance for stakeholders

Training Opportunities

A comprehensive package of training will be agreed in consultation with the supervisors. Elements of training will be provided by the supervisors, University of East Anglia and by other providers. In addition to the standard training opportunities that an economics PhD student can expect, they will receive considerable on the job training interacting with senior policy experts at NCC throughout the project. The student will be embedded in NCC's Transformation Community, so be fully immersed in methods and approaches to transformation in local government. Beyond the academic and professional training, this studentship offers the holder the opportunity to build a strong network in local government and education, paving the way to future employment in the sector

Applicants: essential and/or desirable attributes/skills

Studentship Details:

This studentship must be taken as a +3 award (a three-year PhD)

- It may be taken full-time or part-time
- The studentship award covers your university fees, and provides you with a stipend of £15,609 per year. You will also be able to apply for small amounts of additional funding via the SeNSS Research Training Support Grant.

Residential eligibility

To be eligible for a full award you must be a Home or International student who satisfies the criteria below:

To be a **home** student, you must meet the following criteria:

- Be a UK national (meeting residency requirements), or
- Have settled status, or
- Have pre-settled status (meeting residency requirements), or
- Have indefinite leave to remain or enter.

If you do not meet any of the criteria above, you are classed as an international student.
