FROM THE RABBI

"I'm Bored"



The nature of the Jewish calendar in the fall gives a sense of feast and famine. We have the month of Tishrei which is jam-packed with holidays. This is followed by the month of Heshvan which contains no holidays. In fact we don't have another Jewish festival until Hanukkah which this year fall just after Thanksgiving at the end of November. At times I wonder to myself, "Couldn't we have had a little bit of spacing between these observances?"

Then I think there is something powerful of nearly a month of reflecting and rejoicing. Then it lets us appreciate the calm of the month of Heshvan. This month reminds us that life needs "boring." What I mean by that is that we can't always be stimulated.

I think in our current culture, we forget the benefits of down time. I recall reading in a few different sources that there is incredible benefit from being "bored." I think in a modern day society, when we have access to so much information, we don't allow ourselves to simply sit and not do.

Thankfully, we have a religious culture that reminds us to take a regular pause. This pause is called Shabbat. Shabbat is an opportunity to not be in a hurry. In fact, you are allowed to be a little bored on a Shabbat afternoon. It is a time to be with your thoughts and assess what you need. I think that Heshvan works in a similar fashion. It reminds us to revel in the everyday. From a Religious School perspective, it provides us a period of time of when we don't have special themes dictated by the calendar. We can establish a routine. This year I encourage all of us to be inspired by the calm of the month of Heshvan. May we revel in establishing a routine for ourselves, and may we find the blessing of being a little bored.



That boredom can be the irritant that produces a pearl of a brilliant idea. It may give you the space to really assess where you are and what is important to you. Being bored is not a bad thing. Reframed, it could be a sign that you

need to slow down and do some serious thought. I encourage all of us to take some time for ourselves and think how we can live our best lives, and then live them. Let us just be reminded that living our best lives doesn't mean we always have to be doing. It can include some downtime too.

I hope that everyone has a meaningful Heshvan.

From PRESIDENT

Following is the Yom Kippur appeal delivered at Kol Nidre:

I wish all of you here, in person and online, a Yom Kippur with more discipline than discomfort, more understanding than unease, and more heart than hunger.

On this most important of days, we aim to set aside material desires, social status, financial standing, and other worldly distractions to focus on repentance and prayer. We strive to turn away from sin and toward our true and better natures. So what am I doing up here? I'm not a prayer leader, and I don't have wisdom to help make Yom Kippur more meaningful for you.

Instead, on the holiest day of the year, I am here to ask for money. Why? Because, even in the time of COVID, this evening's service is likely to be the best-attended event of the year. So, is my request opportunistic and incompatible with the spirit of Yom Kippur? Yes, it is.

But before now, I never questioned the timing or appropriateness of Yom Kippur appeals. We hear and sing Kol Nidre three times. We do the Al-Het. The synagogue president asks you for money. Get out that card; fold a tab with a large number on it. Tradition!

But now that the task falls to me, I feel conflicted. Over the past twenty or so years here at Or Ami – in my roles as congregant, committee member, board member, and president – I have learned, beyond any doubt, that we can't survive without High Holy Day pledges. Still, asking you for money this evening conflicts with my growing understanding of the meaning of Yom Kippur.

When I was a child in the 1970s, my family joined Beth Am, one of Or Ami's predecessor congregations, and my brother Mark had his Bar Mitzvah there in 1979. Shortly after my own Bar Mitzvah, confirmation, and graduation at Beth Yeshurun, I entered an extended period of religious ambivalence.

Finally, in my 30s, I renewed my commitment to Judaism by joining Or Hadash. Within two years, Or Hadash combined with Beth Am to become Or Ami. With guidance from leaders and friends, including a few who knew me as a child at Beth Am, I continue to explore the meaning of prayer, Torah, God, and the sanctity of occasions such as these High Holy Days.

If I could, I would amend Or Ami's by-laws to abolish Yom Kippur appeals. But I can't. We need this Kol Nidre intrusion to maintain a holy community that can survive not only in our members' heads and hearts, but also in the real world. That's our synagogue in the real world. We are a holy community, yes, but one with financial needs – some predictable, some unexpected – that even the sincerest, most heartfelt prayers cannot erase.

Yet Or Ami's dues, pledges, and fees do a lot more than keep our lights on, our air conditioning running, and our building habitable. They support intangible treasures of the soul and spirit that can't be measured in dollars and cents:

- Our presence as an egalitarian, loving religious family
- Our commitment to Jewish values
- Our open and welcoming culture
- Our promotion of open-mindedness and mutual respect
- Our encouragement and training of children and adults to participate as prayer leaders, not as a means to an end. but as a reward in itself

No spreadsheet can capture the value of these gifts. So that's why I'm here. The love of money can wreak disharmony, inequity, and sin – exactly what we're combating on Yom Kippur – but the sensible use of money can support spiritual wellness, tolerance, and holiness.

At Or Ami, we work hard to use money the right way. The executive board, trustees, and committees make decisions based on a common goal: what's best for the Or Ami community. Our meetings, discussions, and debates hinge on reaching consensus or sensible compromise focused on the best ways to support this goal.

With that in mind: if you can make a High Holy Day pledge, please do so. If you can't participate this year, that's OK. Many in our community face financial hardships that make a monetary pledge impossible. But we are here for all. We do not have a more lavish sanctuary for our elite. We don't have an Executive Lounge where big donors smoke cigars and drink martinis. We don't have a class system. But we do have a great staff and many community members whose efforts deserve as much gratitude as we can give.

Rabbi Estes, our spiritual guide and handyman; Becca Evans, our great administrator, with legendary patience and perseverance; Murray Adelstein, our inventive, spirited education director; our devoted teachers; our Gabbayim; our Torah readers; our prayer leaders, in particular Augusta Levine, who has tutored generations of Bar and Bat Mitzvah students; the committees and chairs; Board members; and many more. Their immeasurable contributions keep Or Ami whole and holy.

Whether or not you can make a financial pledge, please consider joining a committee, sharing your knowledge and skills as a Torah or Haftarah reader (or learning to do so), a Gabbai, a service leader, or a volunteer to meet needs as they arise. Your donations – whether of money, time, brains, or muscle – truly are deeds of lovingkindness. Welcome home to your holy community.

May your experience of this Yom Kippur, this holy season, and this new Jewish year of 5782 give you spiritual and physical strength, fulfillment of hopes and desires, prosperity, and priceless human connections that only a uniquely holy, openminded, and welcoming community such as Or Ami can offer.

SCHOOL AND YOUTH NEWS

from Murray Adelstein, Director of Youth and Education

In 2020, with the onset of Covid-19 and Religious School having to go online, I challenged myself to create articles for the Or Ami newsletter that were not just a series of announcements but also meaningful and provided a sense of hope and encouragement as we navigated these very treacherous uncharted waters. At the time, my goal was to reflect on the rapidly developing events that were evolving and shaping Jewish education for this entire generation. I found that looking for themes through the lyrics of music accomplished these goals while providing the opportunity to tie the wide array of emotions that we were all experiencing with the rapidly changing world.

From the onset, along with the full support of Rabbi Estes, the Board, the Religious Education Committee, and parents, there was a shared sense of responsibility and commitment to ensure our children would continue to receive the best Jewish education that could be offered. So now, a year and a half later, I had to take a step back and do an honest assessment of where we were and how far we have come. It should be no surprise that I went back to my dependable friend, the lyrics of special music. For this article, I have chosen "The Circle Game" by Joni Mitchell.

"Yesterday a child came out to wander, caught a dragonfly inside a jar. Fearful when the sky was full of thunder and tearful at the falling of a star." Everything that was normal turned upside down. Our children found themselves along with siblings and parents confined to their homes and left with laptops and Zoom. Even the sanctuary, classes, and hallways once filled with prayer, laughter, and song were now silenced. "And the seasons, they go round and round, and the painted ponies go up and down. We're captive on the carousel of time."

How could we possibly teach our children the immense value of faith in God, studying Torah, learning Hebrew and the beautiful Jewish traditions that tie us to thousands of years of history, from one generation to the next? "We can't return, we can only look behind, from where we came and go round and round and round, in the circle game".

Fast forward to fall 2021. "There'll be new dreams, maybe better dreams and plenty before the last revolving year is through." In August, we welcomed back our students and families with our first ever field day. The High Holidays provided opportunities for the Or Ami community to pray and celebrate based on the comfort level of each family.

We are so thankful that the Religious School has maintained stability and is fully functional. We are also so very blessed to have four very seasoned teachers, who now are having to adapt to hybrid teaching, both in person and on Zoom. On our first day of class, we had family Tashlich and just celebrated the mitzvah of sharing a meal in the sukkah. Through our continuous improvement process, our Hebrew program is also in the process of being up-

graded. There will be stations and interactive activities for the entire Religious School. "And the seasons, they go round and round, and the painted ponies go up and down.
