

TUSD COVID19 School Garden Response

- Protocol established: consultation with Food Services, site principals, CDC guidelines, and AZDHS best practices
- School garden access and operation differs significantly site to site
- Produce distributions are largely grass-roots school efforts following best practices
- Engaging with TUSD leadership bolstered support/visibility

Sample protocol

 \cdot School gardeners will operate in are outdoor spaces at schools and not enter classrooms, offices, computer labs, bathrooms, etc.

- \cdot Harvesters will consist of groups less than ten (10) people
- \cdot Participants will sign in and a participant log will be maintained
- · A distance of 6 feet between harvesters will be maintained
- · Participants will be briefed on CDC Food Safety Guidelines:

 Produce harvesting and handling will happen according to Arizona Department of Health Services best practices: <u>https://www.azdhs.gov/preparedness/epidemiology-disease-control/food-safety-environmental-services/index.php#sch</u> <u>ool-garden-program-home</u>

- \cdot In addition to AZDHS best practices, harvesters will wear gloves
- · Produce will be distributed in TUSD Food Service provided produce bags
- \cdot Tools and surfaces will be treated with 70% alcohol before and after harvest

PVUSD Garden Maint. Strategies

-Only district staff allowed on campus at specific times when admin are present during weekly resource distribution for students and families.

-Summer crop planning involves late season, single harvest crops that have a flexible harvest window. (flour and popping corn, winter squash, dry beans, potatoes, melons, gourds, etc.)

- All gardens have drip irrigation and timers

- Site specific strategies unique to each garden



Sustaining, distantly



- Fitness 4 Life staff are able to get into the gardens for maintenance, staff are wearing face masks/covering, gloves, 1-2 people.
- Staff are also creating online content for students to do at home via social media and linking content for teachers weekly lesson plans.
- Currently planning a summer distance learning garden component for students to conduct seed/plant observations at home.
- Staff PD opportunities: <u>ServSafe Food Handler Certification (Free until</u> 4/30) <u>servesafe.com</u>

Communication with Administrators

Here are the resources that our WSDA Farm to School Office pulled together:

OSPI Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19) Guidance & Resources:

"Districts will not be prevented from using their facilities to provide child care, for individual staff to remotely lead or develop content for professional learning or staff meetings, to hold Individualized Education Program (IEP) meetings, to provide direct services to individual students, *or for other activities deemed essential and necessary by the district administration."*

Governor's Order on Statewide K-12 Closures:

"Nothing in this order shall be construed as precluding a public school district, charter school, or private school from using their school facilities to provide childcare, **nutrition programs**, and other **social services** necessary to preserve and **maintain life, health, property or the public peace**"

Governor's Stay at Home Order:

"Essential activities permitted under this Proclamation are limited to the following:

§ 1) Obtaining necessary supplies and services for family or household members and pets, *such as groceries, food and supplies* for household consumption

§ 4) Engaging in outdoor exercise activities...but only if appropriate social distancing practices are used"

Washington State COVID-19 Response: Essential Businesses

Food and agriculture: Essential Workforce

§ Workers supporting groceries, pharmacies, and other retail that sells food and beverage products, including but not limited to...*Farmers' markets, Food banks, Farm and produce stands*"

§ "Farmworkers and support service workers to *include those who field crops*"

Other community-based government operations and essential functions: Essential Workforce

§ "Workers supporting public and private childcare establishments, licensed pre-K establishments, K- 12 schools, colleges, and universities *for purposes of distance learning, or the provision of school meals*..."

And here's what we've heard from our State Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI):

Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) has been getting **questions regarding what is allowed in terms of** school gardening activities during the COVID-19 school closures and the governor's Stay Home, Stay Healthy orders. Since Washington is a local control state, OSPI leaves the decision about what kinds of school gardening activities may continue at this time to school districts. Activities that do not align with the governor's Stay Home, Stay Healthy orders should cease to continue while those orders are in effect, but this does not mean that all school gardening activity must come to a halt. Activities that should not take place during the Stay Home, Stay Healthy orders includes:

Any onsite educational, recreational or other K-12 activities that are not associated with onsite childcare or meal service. If district leadership determines it to be appropriate, some school gardening activities may continue, such as watering and general maintenance of school gardens by designated staff. If school gardens are actively producing food to support the meal programs being operated through the school district, that may be appropriate use of school gardens at this time if approved by district leadership. If your district decides to continue school garden operations, we encourage you to reach out to your local health department for guidance on health and safety practices that should be in place for those activities. You can also view the Washington State Department of Health COVID-19 guidance for schools.

Please note that this guidance is not a directive of the governor or the state superintendent. This guidance is based on previous guidance already provided by the governor and state superintendent regarding appropriate use of school facilities during this time. School property is public property, right? Gardens are outside, not inside the buildings, right? I don't see how this could possibly be an issue. Grocery stores are essential businesses = farmers markets = gardens. Right?

And here's how one of our partner districts chose to communicate with principals (after 4 weeks of a lot of parent and Common Threads Advocacy!)

Mount Baker School District Elementary Garden Access (written from Curriculum Director to School Principals)

1. Garden maintenance will be directed and supported by Common Threads, School buildings will not be accessed and there is no expectation of school staff support (including janitorial support).

2. Common Threads will coordinate the volunteers and follow best practice protocols for sanitizing and social distancing.

3. Communication with volunteers will be managed by Common Threads.



Workplace Protocol for Employees

Best Practices during Covid-19

- <u>Signage</u>
- Handwashing
- Masks
- Alcohol > Bleach



- Please stay home if you or a household member are sick.
- Please wear a mask and bring your own gloves and hand drying towel.
- Prop open all gates/doors first thing, to eliminate the need to touch them during your stay.
- One person at a time in the shed.
- Wash your hands before and after gardening, after blowing your nose, coughing, sneezing, or touching your face.
- Practice social distancing. Work at least 6' apart at all times. Working 10'+ apart gives some cushion.
- Disinfect equipment (tools, buckets, hoses, wheelbarrow, etc.) before and after you use it. Bring your own tools from home if you have them, but please don't share them with others.
- Spray your way in, spray your way out. Please spray/wipe all surfaces/objects before and after you touch them. There is bleach solution spray provided. Leave on <u>surface</u> for at least 1 minute before wiping down. Please use your own rags.

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


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
